Ancestry of Frank Arthur Hudgik Born August 10, 1924

Research Objective

Information in this report is what is known and supported by evidence as of April 19, 2018. The goal of this research project was to trace the ancestry of Frank Arthur Hudgik, born in Holyoke, Massachusetts, in 1924. His father was Frank Stanley Hudgik, born in Sunderland, Massachusetts, in 1904. His mother was Fanny Knowles, born in Slapton, Devon, England, in 1905. In order to maximize research time, the focus was on Frank S. and Fanny Hudgik and their direct line ancestors. While collateral lines (aunts, uncles, cousins) may be mentioned, they were not fully explored. Ambiguous results are communicated with wording such as "about," "possibly," or "probably" and not cited as fact. Please also note that there are many images in this document. For the most part, these are cropped images of important documents.

Accuracy of Source Data

Names

Levels of literacy in the past meant that many people did not know how to spell their name. So at times of registering births, marriages, or deaths, the names would be recorded in the way the registrar or priest/vicar thought they should be spelled. Taking into account regional accents and pronunciations, it is not surprising that names in records are spelled in many different ways.

In this report, names are transcribed as they appear in historical records. The correct spelling, or more recent spelling, of a name is noted in brackets. For example, Nanny [Fanny] Knowles and Zopha [Sophie] Hudzik.

Ages

Ages were also sometimes recorded inaccurately.

When marrying, a person needed consent if they were under a certain age, so people often said they were older, or "of full age," so that they didn't need parents' permission.

Often people simply didn't know their exact birth date, as it wasn't particularly relevant to their lives. People didn't have calendars as they do today, and there was no money to celebrate or mark the occasion. Subsequently, people often quoted incorrect ages on official records such as the census.

If they had a very young child working, they might exaggerate that child's age to make it look like he or she was old enough to work rather than be at school.

In certain census years, ages were rounded off. For example, in the 1841 England census the ages of people over 15 years old were usually rounded down to the nearest 5 years.

Census Accuracy

While the questions in census records varied from year to year, census information generally included names of other household members, ages, birthplaces, residence, occupation, immigration and citizenship details, marriage information, military service, and more.

Most census information is reliable. Residence information on the census is especially believable because a census taker (enumerator) visited each household. But some information such as birthplace of parents may not have been known. Information may have been given to a census taker by any member of the family, or by a neighbor. Some information may have been incorrect or deliberately falsified. Immigrants may have had trouble understanding questions and communicating their answers. Enumerators may have had difficulty understanding an immigrant's accent.

Early census records contained vague instructions, and enumerators may have inaccurately interpreted their duties or census questions. The accuracy of spelling and of census information was totally at the mercy of the individual enumerator.



• ARTHUR ALBERT ERNEST KNOWLES (page 19) was born in Slapton, Devon, England, December 1862, and died there 21 December 1918. He was the son of THOMAS ELISHA COYDE KNOWLES and SARAH ANN HEXT.

• FANNY COLE (page 19) was born in Slapton, England, October 1864, and died there 31 October 1905. She was the daughter of NICHOLAS COLE and HARRIETT ROSSITER.

• THOMAS ELISHA COYDE KNOWLES (page 24) was baptized in Slapton, 12 May 1833, and died there 27 October 1887. He was the son of ROBERT KNOWLES and MARY COYDE.



First Generation: Frank Stanley Hudgik and Fanny Knowles (Parents)

Frank Hudgik ~ Early Life

Frank Stanley Hudgik was born Frank Hudzik on 21 February 1904, in Sunderland, Franklin County, Massachusetts.¹ He was the first-born son of ethnic Polish immigrants Adam Hudzik and Maryanna Strzempko.

Frank first appears in the U.S. census at age 6. In May of 1910 he was living in Sunderland, Massachusetts, and his father was a farmer. The household included Adam, 38, Mary, 26, Frank, 6, Joseph, 2, and Zopha [Sophie], 1. His father's birthplace was recorded as "Russ-Polish," and his mother's as "Aust-Polish."²

According to the 1920 census, the family was still in Sunderland and living on Amherst Road. The household included Adam, 44, Mary, 35, Frank, 15, Joseph, 12, Sophy [Sophie], 10, Walter, 8, Helen, 7, Eddie, 4, and Tessie, 2.³ (See census image page 17.)

Sometime in the early 1920s the Hudzik family moved to Holyoke, Massachusetts.

Fanny Knowles ~ Early Life

Fanny Knowles was born on 31 October 1905, in Slapton, County Devon, England.⁴ She was the seventh child of Arthur Knowles and Fanny Cole. She had three brothers, Frederick, Walter, and Charles, and three sisters, Edith, Alice, and Gladys.

Fanny's mother died on the day Fanny was born.⁵

Fanny first appears in the England census at age 5. In 1911 she was living in Slapton with her father Arthur, 48, stepmother Edith, 49, sister Alis [Alice], 12, and sister Gladys, 11. The 1911 census was the first census where the original forms were kept. The handwriting below is that of Arthur Knowles. The 1911 census was also the first to include an infirmity column to report whether a person was "totally deaf, deaf and dumb, totally blind, lunatic, imbecile, or feeble-minded." Arthur reported that his daughter Alice was feebleminded.⁶

Britain entered into the First World War in August of 1914. To avoid German Zepplin attacks, the Knowles family probably did not use lights after sunset, and they probably lived in fear of their seaside village being shelled by the German Navy. The war ended in November of 1918.

Fanny's father died on 21 December 1918.⁷ In February of 1919, Fanny's sister Edith Dewey, who was living in the U.S., applied for a passport so that she could return to England to care for Fanny, her "young orphaned sister."⁸

Fanny's oldest siblings Edith, b. 1885, Frederick, b. 1887, and Walter, b. 1889, had immigrated to the United States twenty-one years earlier in 1898.



On 8 October 1919, Fanny left England to join her siblings in America. She departed from Southampton, England on the ship "Adriatic." She was 13 years old, and according to the passenger list she traveled alone; her aunt "Mrs. Elliot," paid her passage; she would stay with her sister Edith Dewey of 178 Chestnut Street, Holyoke, Massachusetts. Fanny arrived in New York on 17 October 1919.⁹

At the time of the 1920 U.S. census, Fanny and her brother Walter were living with their brother Frederick and his family at 321 Sargeant Street in Holyoke, Massachusetts.¹⁰

Frank and Fanny ~ Life Together

Frank S. Hudzik and Fanny Knowles married on 25 February 1924. Frank was 19 years old, and Fanny was 18. Frank reported his occupation as "assistant steward." Fanny reported her occupation as "weaver."¹¹

According to Hudgik family oral history, Fanny thought that the name Hudzik was too common, and she told Frank that he would have to change his name. Frank and Fanny's marriage record shows Frank's surname as Hudzik, but this was about the time that records for Frank and Fanny started appearing with their surname recorded as Hudgik.

Frank and Fanny's son Frank Arthur was born on 10 August 1924. Their son Ronald Earl was born on 10 March 1927.

According to the 1930 census, Frank and Fannie [Fanny] Hudgik were living at 97 Jackson Street in Holyoke with their two sons. Frank was employed as a foreman at National Blank Book Co. The household included Frank, 26, Fannie, 24, Frank, 5, and Ronald, 3.¹²

By 1933 Frank's parents and most of his siblings had moved to New Jersey, and by 1936 Frank had a job as a Foreman in New Jersey.¹³ Fanny and their two sons moved with him to New Jersey in 1936 and stayed there until 1937 when Fanny moved back to Holyoke with their sons. In 1938 she was living at 58 Franklin Street in Holyoke.

Fanny was 33 years old when she married Wilson K. Green in 1939. Wilson was 25. In April of 1940 they were living at 58 Franklin Street in Holyoke with Fanny's two sons and a lodger. Wilson was working as an assistant manager at a grocery chain store.¹⁵

Wilson Green died in 1940 sometime after the census was taken in April.

The United States declared war on Japan on 8 December 1941, one day after the attack on Pearl Harbor that killed 2,400 Americans. Frank and Fanny's son Frank served in the 8th Battalion of the Navy Seabees (U.S. Naval Construction Battalions) from August 1943 to December 1945. The 8th Battalion landed on Iwo Jima 3 March 1945, during the battle for that island.

Daily life on the home front was challenging as men shipped out and families rationed food and common supplies to support the war effort. Each American family was issued a ration book that contained an allotted number of coupons to purchase staples such as coffee, sugar, meat, and canned goods.

Frank S. Hudgik fell seriously ill sometime around 1945 or 1946. Fanny took him back into her home and cared for him. He died on 15 September 1946 in Springfield. He was 44 years old.¹⁶

In the 1940s and 1950s Fanny worked as a baseball stitcher at the Spalding factory in Chicopee, Massachusetts.¹⁷

Fanny married Harley Barrows about 1947.

In the summer of 1947, Fanny and Harley traveled to Montana to visit Harley's parents. Fanny sent many postcards to her sons during that trip, and according to those postcards, Fanny and Harley made stops in Chicago and Colorado.

Will never forget this trip in all my life. Am feeling fine hope you are both well & being good boy's all my love Mom"

In 1948 Fanny and Harley were living at 58 Franklin Street in Holyoke.¹⁸ On 25 October 1951 they divorced.¹⁹

On 18 March 1955 Fanny became a naturalized United States citizen.²⁰



Fanny (Knowles) Barrows died on 23 December 1980 in Holyoke, Massachusetts.²¹ She was 75 years old.

Second Generation: Adam Hudzik and Maryanna Strzempko (Paternal Grandparents)

From the end of the eighteenth century until 1918, Poland ceased to exist as an independent country. During that period Poland was governed by the German, Russian, and Austrian Empires. At the turn of the twentieth century, Polish immigration to the U.S. exploded. Imperial repression, land shortages, and chronic unemployment made life more and more untenable for the Poles of Europe, and as the nineteenth century waned they left for America by the thousands, then by the hundreds of thousands. U.S. documents may indicate these individuals were German, Russian, or Austrian when really they were ethnic Poles.



Adam Hudzik ~ Early Life

Adam Hudzik was born on 24 December 1875 in Poton, Russia,²² to Martin Hudzik and Mary Oleander.²³

The Russian Empire annexed a large area of Poland as illustrated by the three areas of green on the map above. Today that area consists of Ukraine, Belarus, Lithuania, Latvia and the eastern district of Podlaskie Province, Poland. Web searches for Poton in those countries have been unsuccessful, and attempts to locate Poton on historical maps have also been unsuccessful. The name of the town might have been changed, or it may no longer exist.

The Russian Empire ruled harshly, and Poles struggled against official anti-Polish oppression. After the Polish uprising of 1863, many Poles were exiled to Siberia, and many villages were burned. Russification intensified, and the Polish language was banned in public places. In the 1880s, Polish was banned in schools. Illiteracy rose as Poles refused to learn Russian. Students were beaten for resisting Russification.

Adam Hudzik was one of the ethnic Poles who emigrated at the end of the nineteenth century. On 16 March 1895 he departed Bremen, Germany, on the ship "Augusta Victoria" bound for the United States. He arrived at the port of New York on 30 March 1895.²⁴ He was 19 years old.

It is unknown if Adam had any siblings, and no record has been found of any of his family members immigrating to the U.S.

Maryanna Strzempko ~ Early Life

Maryanna Strzempko was born in 1885 in Lonski, Galicia, Austria, to Maciej Strzempko and Anna Grzela.²⁵

Galicia was a province in pre-1918 Austrian occupied Poland. It is the orange area of the map on the previous page. The area that was Galicia is today half in Poland and half in Ukraine.

Web searches for Lonski in Poland and in Ukraine have been unsuccessful, and attempts to locate Lonski on historical maps have also been unsuccessful. The name might have been changed, or the town may no longer exist.

A search for Lonski at mapa.szukacz.pl did return this result:

"Lonski Department" could be a clue to the location of the nineteenth century town of Lonski. It would place the town in the western area of Galicia as indicated by the red arrow on the map below. Today that area is in Poland.

Galicia in the nineteenth century was the poorest of the Austrian provinces and is considered to be the poorest province of Europe at that time. Poverty in Galicia in the late nineteenth century was extreme. There was a high rate of malnutrition and illness, and there were near constant famines resulting in tens of thousands of deaths per year. Beginning in the 1880s, a mass emigration of the Galician peasantry occurred and continued until the outbreak of the First World War in 1914. Nearly 750,000 people emigrated across the Atlantic from 1880 to 1914. Maryanna Strzempko was one of the hundreds of thousands of ethnic poles who left Galicia.

Maryanna arrived in the United States about 1900 at the age of about 15.²⁶ It is not known if she traveled alone or with family. Her parents never emigrated, but some of her siblings did. Her brother Joseph arrived in the United States in 1904. He reported his place of birth as Lonski, Galicia, Austria on his 1940 alien registration form.

Surname Spelling

In records found for the Hudzik family in the United States, Maryanna's maiden name Strzempko was often misspelled, likely because of the language barrier. Those misspellings were mainly on her children's birth records and include: Strzempek, Sciempka, Staumpthi, Simpka, Champka, and Stempka. Hudzik was sometimes recorded as Hudsek or Hujic.

Adam and Maryanna ~ Life Together

The first record found for Adam and Maryanna was their marriage record. Adam Hudzik and Maryanna Sciempka [Strzempko] were married on 23 November 1901 in Easthampton, Massachusetts. Adam was 24 years old. Maryanna was 16 but reported her age as 18.²⁷

According to the 1910 census, Adam and Maryanna were living in Sunderland, Massachusetts. Adam was a farmer. The household included Adam, 38, Mary, 26, son Frank, 6, son Joseph, 2, and daughter Zopha [Sophie], 1.²⁸ (See census image page 7.)

On 30 December 1911 Adam filed his declaration of intent to become a U.S. citizen. He was 36 years old, and his physical description was recorded on the declaration; color: white, complexion: light, height: 5 feet 5 inches, weight: 145 pounds, color of hair: brown, color of eyes: blue.²⁹

On 30 December 1913 Adam filed his petition for naturalization, and on 25 March 1915 he became a citizen of the United States of America.³⁰ Maryanna also became a U.S. citizen on that day. Up until 1922, an immigrant woman instantly became a U.S. citizen at the moment a judge's order naturalized her immigrant husband.

In April of 1917, the United States declared war on Germany. The third Selective Service registration was held on 12 September 1918 for men ages 18 through 45. Adam was 42 years old when he registered.³¹

In February of 1920, Adam and Maryanna were living on Amherst Road in Sunderland. The household included Adam, 44, Mary, 35, Frank, 15, Joseph, 12, Sophy [Sophie], 10, Walter, 8, Helen, 7, Eddie, 4, and Tessie, 2. According to the census, Adam and Mary's native language was Polish, and that was probably the primary language spoken in their home.³²

On 18 August 1920 the 19th Amendment was ratified. Maryanna may have voted in the presidential election on 2 November 1920. This was the first election in which women had the right to vote in all forty-eight states.

By 1925 Adam and Maryanna had moved the family to 24 N East Street in Holyoke, Massachusetts.³³ The building at that address still stands today and is a three-story brick apartment building that was built in 1910.³⁴ In 1929 the Hudziks moved to 719 Dwight Street.³⁵

In 1930 the family was still living at 719 Dwight Street, and the census household included Adam, 54, Mary, 44, Sophie, 21, Helen, 17, Edward, 14, Tessie, 12, Anthony, 10, and Stanley, 3. One of the questions on the 1930 census was "Age at first marriage." Maryanna's marriage age was reported as 16. The rent for their apartment was \$26 a month. Adam was unemployed. He had previously been working as a chipper in a machine mill. Sophie was an unemployed bindery worker. Helen was the only family member with a job at the time of the census. She was employed as a bindery worker in a paper shop.³⁶

Polish was probably still the primary language spoken in the Hudzik household. Twelve-year-old Tessie was required to answer questions in a special supplementary section of the census that year, and one of the questions was "Language spoken in home in earliest childhood." Her answer was "Polish."

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

Arthur and Fanny ~ Life Together

By 1881 Arthur and Fanny had both left their parents' households, and both were living in Slapton. Fanny was working as a general servant for Thomas and Sarah Eales and living in the Eales household. She was the only servant in the household at that time, and life was probably very hard for her. She was 17 years old but might have started working as young as 14. Her duties would probably have included those of cook, housekeeper, and maid. Arthur was also working as a general servant and was living in the Eliza Bastard household, about seven households away from Fanny.⁴⁴


In 1885 Arthur and Fanny were married in County Devon.⁴⁵

Fanny and Arthur next appear in the 1891 England Census. They were living in Slapton with their three children, Edith, 5, Frederick, 3, and Walter, 1. Arthur was working as a thatcher, a trade he likely learned from his grandfather Robert Knowles. His widowed mother, Sarah, was living with his brother Thomas five households away.⁴⁶




1891 England Census - Arthur Knowles Household, Slapton

Fanny and Arthur had a fourth child, Charles, born about 1893.⁴⁷



On 26 March 1898, Arthur, Fanny, and their four children, boarded the ship "St. Louis" and departed Southampton, England, bound for the United States. They arrived in New York on 2 April 1898 with \$23 in their possession (equivalent of \$648 in 2017.) Their final destination was recorded on the passenger list as "Mrs. Elliot, 539 Canal Street, Holyoke, Mass." Mrs. Elliott was Arthur's sister Augusta who had immigrated to the United States in 1883. Arthur reported his occupation as "gardener."⁴⁸

Arthur and Fanny's daughter Alice was born on 2 September 1898. According to her birth record, the Knowles family was living at 12 Hamilton in Holyoke, Massachusetts. That brick apartment building still stands today. Arthur was working in a paper mill.⁴⁹


By June of 1900 the family was living at 517 Canal Street in Holyoke. Arthur was still working in a paper mill. The census household included Arthur, 36, Fanny, 34, Edith, 14, Freddie, 13, Walter, 10, Charles, 7, and Alice, 1.⁵⁰ Shortly after the 1900 census was recorded, Arthur and Fanny's daughter Gladys was born on 11 August 1900.⁵¹

Tragedy struck on 12 January 1902 when 8-year-old Charles died from a heart infection.⁵²

Arthur traveled back to England in 1902, possibly to bury his son Charles. Although no passenger list was found for his departure from the United States, a passenger list for the ship "St. Paul" shows Arthur returning to the United States from England on 31 May 1902.⁵³

Sometime between 1902 and 1905 Arthur and Fanny returned to Slapton with their two youngest children, Alice and Gladys. They left Edith, Frederick, and Walter in the United States.

On 31 October 1905 Fanny and Arthur's fourth daughter was born in Slapton, but tragedy struck the family again. Fanny (Cole) Knowles died during childbirth.⁵⁴ She was 41 years old. Arthur named his infant daughter Fanny.

According to the 1911 England Census, Arthur, 48, was working as a jobbing gardener and living with his wife, Edith, 49, and his daughters Alice, 12, Gladys, 11, and Fanny, 5, in a six-room house in Slapton, England.⁵⁶ (See census image page 7.)

Arthur Albert Ernest Knowles died on 21 December 1918 at age 56. The cause of death was "Mitral Disease" and "Cerebral Embolism." He was at his sister-in-law's house in Brixham when he died. His name was enumerated on the death record as Arthur Ernest Frederick Adams Knowles. His sister-in-law, who was the informant, was possibly not sure of his given name. ⁵⁷

Almost nothing is known of Martin Hudzik and Mary Oleander. According to census records for their son, Adam Hudzik, his parents were born in Russia and their mother tongue was Polish. Martin Hudzik and Mary Oleander were probably born in Russian-occupied Poland between 1830 and 1860.

According to the 1841 England census, Thomas was 8 years old and living in Slapton. The household included his father Robert, 30, mother Mary, 28, brother Robert, 5, and sister Mary, 1. Thomas's father worked as a thatcher.⁶⁰

In 1851 Thomas was working as a farm servant in the Sellek household in Colaton Raleigh, County Devon. He was 18 years old at that time.⁶¹

Sarah Hext ~ Early Life

Sarah Ann Hext was born about 1832 in South Pool, Devon, England. She was the daughter of Joanna Adams⁶² and Thomas Hext.⁶³

In 1841 Sarah was living in South Pool, County Devon, with her widowed mother, Joanna. Joanna was 45 years old, and Sarah was 8.⁶⁴ At the time of the 1851 census Sarah was still living with her mother. She was working as a dressmaker, and her mother was working as a laundress.⁶⁵

Around this time there was a tragic drama unfolding for the Knowles family. In 1865 Thomas's brother Robert Henry Knowles was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to 15 years penal servitude.⁶⁸ *The Dublin Evening Post* printed the following article in August of 1865:

"MANSLAUGHTER OF A GENTLEMAN. At the Exeter assizes, Robert Henry Knowles was indicted, before Mr. Joseph Willes, for the manslaughter of John Bouchier Phillimore, at Slapton, on the 5th May. The coroner's jury had found verdict of murder against the prisoner, but the grand jury found one for manslaughter only. It appeared that Mr. Phillimore was a gentleman of good birth and education, the son of Captain Phillimore. He had for some time resided at Slapton, at Start Bay, where there was deep sea fishing. Mr. Phillimore had very bad sight, and was unable to join in the usual amusements of gentlemen, and he employed himself in the deep sea fishing, and had an interest in several fishing boats. On the 28th of April a boat, called "the Ranter," had been out fishing, but the prisoner had not joined the screw. In the evening of that day the prisoner went to Mr. Phillimore's house. He was asked why he had not been out fishing. He said he had not chosen to do so. Mr. Phillimore told him he was no better than an idler. The prisoner used some offensive expression to Mr. Phillimore, and then struck him in the face. Mr. Phillimore returned the blow. Some of Mr. Phillimore's servants came up, and turned the prisoner out of the house. The prisoner then went towards his own house, but turned back, and a servant named Coles took up a broom, and held it so as to prevent the prisoner going towards Mr. Phillimore. The prisoner then struck at Coles, and after a struggle Coles found he had a severe cut in the leg. It was then seen that the prisoner had a knife in his hand, which he brandished about. He got towards Mr. Phillimore, and inflicted a severe cut in his leg 6 inches deep. The men tied up Mr. Phillimore's leg, and sent for a surgeon, as the blood was flowing frightfully. A surgeon came and bound up the wound, and at first everything appeared to be progressing favourably; but a change took place, and Mr. Phillimore died on the 5th of May. The effort in the cross-examination of the witnesses was to show that Mr. Phillimore was a person of violent temper and conduct, and that at the time in question there were several persons pressing round the prisoner. Mr. Cox, on behalf of the prisoner, urged that he had been set upon by several persons, and, having a knife, he had drawn it for the purpose of defending himself, or of intimidating those who were overpowering him. The jury found the prisoner guilty, and he was sentenced to fifteen years' penal servitude."69

> At Slapton, South Devon, aged 34, John Bouchier Phillimore, esq., son of the late Adm. Sir John Phillimore. The deceased had resided in Slapton for a year or two, and employed a crew, being fond of fishing. Knowles, one of the men in his service, on the 28th of April was at Mr. Phillimore's house, and on being spoken to about neglecting his work, became abusive, and struck his employer. 'Two men went to Mr. Phillimore's assistance, and tried to hold the assailant till a policeman was fetched. In his rage, Knowles drew a knife, cut one of the men, and wounded Mr. Phillimore so severely, that he died a week after.

After serving nine years of his fifteen-year sentence, Robert Henry Knowles died in prison at the Freemantle Invalid Depot in Australia in 1874 of "exhaustion after scrofulous abscesses."⁷¹

According to the 1871 England Census, Thomas was still working as a boot maker and also as a "Local Methodist Preacher." There was a new addition to the household; Thomas and Sarah's son Arthur was born in 1863.⁷²





In 1871 Nicholas and Harriet were living in Brixham, Devon County. The census household included Nicholas, 24, Harriet, 25, Fanny, 6, Ellen, 3, and Rose, 1.⁸⁴

By 1881 daughters Fanny, 17, and Ellen, 14, had moved out of the household and were working as servants. Daughter Rose, 11, was still at home, now with five younger sisters, Jessie, 9, Alice, 7, twins Mary Maria and Harriet Louisa, 5, and infant Emily Maude, two months. Nicholas was working as a farm laborer.⁸⁵

In 1891 Nicholas, 45, was a patient at the Devon County Lunatic Asylum,⁸⁶ and his family was scattered across Devon County. According to the 1891 census, his wife Harriet, 45, was working as a cook in the Codner household in Torquay.⁸⁷ Daughters Fanny, 26, and Ellen, 24, were married and living with their own families. Rose, 20, Jessie, 19, and twins Harriet and Mary, 15, were living in separate households working as servants. No definitive record for Alice could be found. Emily Maude, 10, was living with her sister Ellen.

Prisoner drew quite a crowd around him in the thoroughfares, and P.C. Kemp and P.S. Stenti- ford warned him. As he persisted in his disorderly conduct the constable took him into custody, and on the way to the lock-up prisoner assaulted him very badly, biting him and kicking him in the leg and shoulder. He also kicked the Sergeant very hard. There were four previous convictions. The Magistrates fined prisoner 12s inclusive for being drunk and disorderly, or in default seven days without hard labour, and for the assault on the constable he was sent to goal for fourteen days with hard labour, without the option of a fine.

By 1901 Nicholas had been discharged from the Devon County Asylum and was living with his wife, Harriet, in Dartmouth, Devon County. He was working as a farm laborer again.⁸⁸ Nicholas was in trouble with the law on several occasions for being drunk and disorderly.⁸⁹





No definitive records have been found for the family after 1841.

Much of the maternal line research was centered on Slapton, Devon, England. The 1850 Gazetteer of Slapton England gave this description: "SLAPTON, a pleasant village on the acclivity, rising from the central part of the coast of Start Bay, 6 miles S.W. by S. of Dartmouth, has in its parish 726 inhabitants, 3260 acres of tithe free land, and many scattered houses, commanding fine views of the bay and coast. On the beach is the Sands Hotel, from which visitors have a fine promenade at low water along the sands to within a mile of Start point. The hotel is elegantly fitted up for the accommodation of visitors, and about 200 yards from the beach is a long fresh-water lake of about 300 acres, called the Ley or Hey, well stocked with fish and wild fowl, and divided from the sea in some places only by a ridge called the Long Sand."¹⁵⁹



According to the 2011 census, the population of Slapton was 434.

The freshwater lagoon is set within a National Nature Reserve, and there are many walks and trails around the reserve. A Sherman tank on Slapton Sands is part of the memorial to the hundreds of American servicemen who lost their lives there during Exercise Tiger in 1944.

"Knowles Name Meaning English: topographic name for someone who lived at the top of a hill or by a hillock, from a genitive or plural form of Middle English knoll 'hilltop', 'hillock' (Old English cnoll; see Knoll), or habitational name from any of the many places named with this word. Irish: Anglicized form of Gaelic Ó Tnúthghail (see Newell)."¹⁶⁰

Topographical surnames were among the earliest created, since both natural and man-made features in the landscape provided obvious and convenient distinguishing names in the small communities of the Middle Ages.

"Hudzik Name Meaning

Ukrainian: from hudzyk 'button' metonymic occupational name for a button maker or nickname for a small man. Slovak: nickname for a thin man. Slovak chudzik, from chudý 'thin'."¹⁶¹

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Further Research

It is unlikely that anything more can be discovered about the fourth generation of the paternal line without enlisting the help of a professional genealogist in Poland.

Future research should focus on expanding what is known about both direct *and* indirect (collateral) ancestors in England, Ireland, and the U.S. Additional information about indirect ancestors (cousins, aunts, uncles, and in-laws) may reveal important information about direct ancestors.
